notch (usually arts college professors and/or other highly experienced artists), the facilities are very good, and the surrounding area in south western Oklahoma is beautiful. Auditions begin in the spring, and the website will have the most up to date info on how/where to audition.

The University of Oklahoma Fine Arts branch library houses the collection of materials supportive to the disciplines of art, dance and music. The Fine Arts Library holds 81,000 volumes of books, 2,087 reels of microfilm, and 8,440 sheets of microfiche." This is probably the most extensive fine arts library in the state. The OU library system offers varying levels of visitor passes and cards, and the librarians tend to be helpful at fielding questions (don't be afraid to ask!).

IV. Volunteer Opportunities

Volunteering to help with art shows and events is a great way for high school artists (read: you) to become involved with the arts community in your area. Most organizations putting on the show are grateful for the help, and you, the high school student can benefit from sometimes gaining free admission to events like Momentum and introducing yourself to the people putting on these shows. If you know of a specific event you are interested, you might have the best luck contacting the organization putting on the event directly to see if you can help.
